Harpers in Kentucky - Nantura

Part of the Harper Clan left West Virginia in the late 18th century to make their home in Eastern Kentucky. They established horse farms, and bred winning racehorses for much of the 19th century. The graves of several of these winners can still be seen in cemeteries there today.

Patricia Erigero has kindly shared her research on the Harper horses with us. She writes:

John Harper's father settled at Midway, Woodford County, Kentucky, on 2,200 acres of rich grasslands and woods. The Harper family's Nantura Stock Farm, at Spring Station, Kentucky (near Midway), was named for John's foundation mare, Nantura. It became home to several outstanding thoroughbreds of the late 1800s, and the racing greats Longfellow and Ten Broeck. When Frank Harper raised these stone obelisks over the graves of his heroic champions first for Ten Broeck in 1887, then for Longfellow in 1893 - they became the first stone memorials to mark an equine grave in the state of Kentucky.

Harper had a well-established reputation as a breeder and trainer, dating well back beyond the Civil War. John's reputation as a horseman was so great that if the public got wind of the Harpers betting on their horses, they would stampede to do the same.

Longfellow's dam, Nantura, came to John Harper when she was three years old. A towering presence on the turf and in the breeding shed, the big, blaze-faced Longfellow was the bestknown thoroughbred of the latter quarter of the 19th century in the U.S., and was famous far beyond American borders.

Longfellow spent his entire stud career at Nantura, dying, after a year of progressive failure, on the farm where he was born, November 5, 1893. at age 26. His obituaries in newspapers across the

country were, in many instances, headlined "A King is Dead."

Ten Broeck (also bred by John Harper) set 6 time records at all distances up to four miles. At age five, Ten Boeck won nine of his ten races, and set the record for a mile at 1:39 3/4 - a record that stood for thirteen years.

Shortly before his death, John Harper wrote, "I am about to return to my home in Kentucky, and I may never come East again. I am an old man. I have been a companion of race horses for three score years, and every year I have lived, I learned something...My horses always understand me, and I know just what they asked for. I have bred and owned many good horses, any one of whom, when I trained him for a race, would win if he could, or die in the attempt. They have never deceived me.

Unless they met a better horse, they always won... I have made them my companions, and have obtained the pleasure of my life from the association. My horse Longfellow will never race again, because he has met with an accident that will prevent it; but not only was he the best and gamest race-horse that I ever owned, but, in my judgment, he was the best race-horse that this or any other country has known. Had he remained sound to the end of the race at Saratoga, he would have made time never dreamed of..." —John Harper, published in Spirit of the Times, August 1872

John Harper died two years later, at the age of 73 yrs., in the spring of 1874, never having quite recovered from the accident which cost his beloved Longfellow his racing career. Adding to that sense of loss was the shocking murder of John's elderly brother and sister in 1871. [Next year's Harper Newsletter will carry the story of this horrific event.]

Harper's nephew, Frank B. Harper, inherited the horses and original homestead after John's death – which, by then, consisted of 577 acres of grassland. Prior to the Civil War it had been highly productive cropland. It was well-watered with many ponds fed by springs. The farm included a mile training track used to privately school the Harper's colts and fillies. After he inherited the farm, Frank officially adopted Nantura Stock Farm as the name of the breeding operation, in honor of his uncle's noted mare.

Dear Family and Friends:




